Thompson My first annual report covered the first year of the Bureau's work, June 1977 to June 1978, but in future all reports will be in line with the Treasurer's accounts which cover the financial year ending 31st March.

During this time 1815 people consulted the Bureau, most of them by personal visit, but an increasing number by telephone, and some by letter. Two people were visited in their homes. Quite a number of them returned one or more times for further advice on the same problem, but this is not included in the statistics this year. Records of these enquiries have been kept from 1st April, and the numbers will be available next year.

### Staff and Training

One new worker completed the basic training and was accepted by the Selection committee of the Bureau.

Workers attended training sessions on the problems of oneparent families, housing, the disabled, pensions, and debt counselling. All the workers attended more than the minimum requirement of six staff meetings in the year.

#### Statistics

The summary of enquiries later in this report is divided into 14 categories as used by all Bureaux throughout the UK. In having "Housing" at the top of the list and "Consumer" second Wokingham differs from the national statistics which have "Family and Personal" well in the lead. It will be interesting to see if this continues in the future or if we come into line with the rest of the country eventually. "Leisure Activities", in seventh place here and eleventh nationally, reflects, I believe, the shifting population of Wokingham, as people new to the area often come in wanting to know how to get to know people and to become part of the community.

There is also a table of the areas in which the callers live.

67% come from Wokingham itself, 6% from Wokingham Without, and only

9% from the outlying areas. This is partly due to the fact that many

people work or shop in Reading or Bracknell, and therefore visit the

bureaux there, but I feel that there may be a lack of information

about the Wokingham bureau outside the town. The enquiries listed

under "Other or Unknown" are partly of other villages nearby, partly

places outside the area, and also of people who were not asked for,

or did not wish to give, their addresses. If callers wish to remain

anonymous they are, of course, at liberty to do so.

### The Future

The increasing number of people calling at the bureau is making the need of more interviewing space an urgent priority. We do not like to keep callers waiting when there is a worker available, but with only one private interview room we can deal only with one confidential matter at a time. The worker in the main office can answer only questions of a non-personal nature. I hope that there will be funds available to meet this need soon.

Steps are also being taken to start a legal panel for free advice from solicitors. Enquirers will first be interviewed by workers, and only given appointments if their problems and circumstances seem to warrant them.
